

PENTATHLON CHAMP HERE ON SATURDAY

GEORGETOWN ENTERS BIG BOB
LEGENDRE.

WON HIS FAME IN FRANCE

Athlete, Who Will Be Seen in Shot Put and in Hurdles in the Indoor Games in Fifth Regiment Armory, Won the All-around Championship in the Interallied Track and Field Championships Held in Pershing Stadium Last Summer.

Some very important entries from Georgia Tech and Georgetown have reached Secretary Cox, of the Games Committee in charge of the big indoor meet and relay carnival at the Fifth Regiment Armory next Saturday night.

Georgia Tech, which has come into great prominence in athletics, especially in football and track, has entered its four best men. George C. Griffin will enter the 100 and 220-yard dashes. This Southern speed merchant holds a record of 10 flat for 100 yards, made in a dual meet between Georgia Tech and Suwanee College. In the 220 race his time was 23 1-5.

Bob Legendre, pentathlon champion, and J. J. Connolly, former mile school-boy champion, will be here for Georgetown. The shot put and hurdles will find the famous Legendre in competition, while Connolly will try out his speed in the Varsity Club Thousand Yard Special and several other events.

Fame came to Legendre when he won the pentathlon championship at the Interallied track and field championships held at Pershing Stadium, Paris, from June 23 to July 6, 1919. The Pentathlon, or all-around championship, was held on July 1, the five events on the program being: 200 meters dash, running broad jump, 16-pound shot put, discus throw and 1,500 meters run. Eight athletes, representing four countries, entered the events, and Legendre, of the United States, eventually won the competition, scoring a total of 461 points. He took first place in the 200 meters dash and the running broad jump; second place in the shot put and discus throw; but lost considerable points in the 1,500 meters race by taking only fifth place. Vidal, also of the United States, took second place, while Andre, that hero of the French athletics, took the third honors. Legendre scored 461 points, Vidal, 431, and Andre, 399.

J. J. Connolly may be heard from in the Varsity Club Thousand Yard Special, in which ten of the best college men in the country will compete for the handsome cup offered. In a recent race with Jole Ray, Connolly forced the great champion to his utmost and compelled him to establish a Canadian record to win.
