

GEORGETOWN ATHLETE IS PENTATHLON CHAMP

SCORES 14 POINTS IN KEEN COMPETITION MEET

First Time in History That Event
Has Not Been Won by Univ.
of Pennsylvania Man

PHILADELPHIA, April 25.—Consistent performances in all five events enabled R. Legendre, of Georgetown, to win the pentathlon championship today at the first day's carnival of sports of the twenty-fifth annual relay races of the University of Pennsylvania on Franklin field. This is the first time since the pentathlon was established, four years ago, that it has been won by any athlete other than a University of Pennsylvania man. Howard Eorry captured it three times and Johnny Bartels won it last year.

Legendre scored 14 points; Bartels was second, with 20. There were more than a dozen starters.

American college championship sprint medley relay race (first and second men each ran 220 yards, third man 440 yards, fourth man 880 yards)—Won by Pennsylvania (Davis, Haymond, Smith, Gustafson); second, Pennsylvania State (Taylor, Hoeker, Demming, Orr; third, Dartmouth (Davis, Carto, Marto, Soakle); fourth, Lehigh (Shultz, Pengelly, Doan, Grace. Time, 3:38 2-5.

Running hop, step and jump—Won by S. Landers, Pennsylvania, distance 44 feet, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch; second, E. Gourdin, Harvard, 42 feet, 8 inches; third, S. Friedman, Pennsylvania, 42 feet, 6 inches.

Running broad jump (pentathlon)—Won by S. Butler, Dubuque, distance 28 feet 11 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches, breaking Pennsylvania pentathlon record of 22 feet 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches, made by Worthington of Dartmouth in 1915; second, R. Legendre, Georgetown, 20 feet 11 $\frac{3}{8}$ inches; third, E. Gilfillan, Notre Dame, 20 feet 4 $\frac{3}{8}$ inches; fourth, C. L. Lewis, Missouri, 20 feet 2 $\frac{5}{8}$ inches.
