

SAYMAN KERR TO COMPETE AT PENN TODAY

Noted Utah Athlete to Race in College Relay Meet

PHILADELPHIA, Penn., April 20.—Sayman Kerr, former Crimson track star and just recently returned from England with the four-mile Pennsylvania relay team, will race in the relay races this afternoon under the Penn colors. He will probably compete in the two-mile relay.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., April 29.—After an opener that consisted more or less of a dress rehearsal, the Pennsylvania relay carnival was ready for its grand finale today.

While only two carnival records were broken yesterday—both by Bob Longender, the all around star of Georgetown—several were expected to be lowered today in the fifty-one events on the card.

WEATHER BETTER.

The weather was better. The stiff, chilly wind that swept the faces of the athletes on the opening day had subsided and a warm early morning sun flooded the city, bringing warmth that made for ideal running conditions.

The card, in addition to scores of high school and interscholastic championships, consists of the pole vault, the high jump, the javelin throw, the shotput, the broad jump and the discus throw in the field events, and the 120-yard hurdles, the 100-yard dash, the two-mile college relay, the one-half-mile college relay and the four-mile college relay.

LEGENDRE REPORTS.

Robert Legendre of Georgetown university won the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival pentathlon contest yesterday afternoon from a high class field of all around athletes. The Georgetown star scored a minimum of eight points, with Reinartz of Muhlenberg college second, with seventeen points. Charles West of Washington and Jefferson college was third with eighteen points. Legendre won three firsts, the broad jump, javelin throw and 200-meter sprint. He was second in the discus throw and third in the 1600-meter run.

Legendre in winning yesterday scored his third victory in this all around event, having won previously in 1919 and 1921. This performance ties the record of J. H. Berry, the famous University of Pennsylvania athlete, who won in 1916, 1916 and 1917. The scores of the athletes to finish follow:

Raymond B. Baker of Bates college repeated his 1921 victory when he won the international two-mile individual race from a classy field of eighteen starters. Harper of Cornell set the pace in the first half-mile, with the pack at his heels. N. Brown, also of Cornell, was the pacemaker at the end of the mile, which he recorded in 4 minutes 52 seconds. Romig of Pennsylvania State took the lead at the mile and a half mark, which he completed in 7 minutes 22 seconds.

Baker, who had been satisfied to remain in the center of the closely bunched field up to this point, jumped into the lead at the pistol shot signaling the final lap, and with a steady sustained sprint ran away from his competitors, winning by twenty yards from Thomson of Hamilton, who followed the New England runner's pace in the final lap and finished second over Romig, Pennsylvania State, by ten feet. N. Brown of Cornell was fourth and Brathbun, Iowa State, fifth.
