

LEGENDRE IS CROWNED

Wins All-Round Championship At Penn Relays—Bartels Runs Second.

Philadelphia, April 25. — Consistent performances in all five events enabled R. Legendre, of Georgetown University, to carry off the Pentathlon championship today at the first day's carnival of sports of the twenty-fifth annual relay races of the University of Pennsylvania on Franklin Field. This is the first time since the Pentathlon was established four years ago that it has been won by any other athlete than a University of Pennsylvania man. Howard Berry captured it three times and Johnny Bartels won it last year.

Legendre scored 14 points; Bartels was second with 20. The others who finished were Lewis, of Missouri, 21 points; Butler, Dubuque, 24; Eckberg, Dartmouth, 25, and Ensign, Ohio Wesleyan, 28. There were more than a dozen starters. Legendre won the 200 metres race and finished second in the broad jump; discus throw and 1500 metres race, and seventh in the javelin throw. Bartels was last in the broad, first in the javelin and discus throw, fourth in the 200 metres and fifth in the 1500 metres events.

Incidentally, three Pentathlon records made on Franklin Field were broken. Butler broke the broad jump figures and Bartels made new marks in the javelin and discus throw.

Chicago won the distance medley relay American championship in the last few yards of the race through the great running of McCosh. Princeton led in the last relay to within 100 yards of the finish when McCosh by a mighty sprint passed McCullough, anchor man for the Jersey team.

The sprint medley relay championship of America was won by the University of Pennsylvania, whose team of sprinters led virtually all the way.

Landers, of Pennsylvania, won the running hop, skip and jump. His mate, Frazier, captured the 440-yard hurdles event, and Emory, of Pennsylvania State College, was first in the 56-pound weight throw. Summary:
