Marathon Promo: A Plot Afoot


It's no secret that, a few years ago, the Boston Marathon was dogging it breathing hard on Heartbreak Hill. The quality of the field was down, and, in 1985, for the first time ever, the city had empty hotel rooms during a Patriot's Day weekend.

As the story goes, the city's financial fathers stepped in to gently convince the Boston Athletic Association that the marathon couldn't be allowed to limp along any longer. It needed to be upgraded. The commerce of the city, they said, would be the beneficiary.

At the time, there was debate. Some purists objected. Commercializing the marathon wouldn't mean a boon to the city or anyone else, they argued. It would just mean a commercialized marathon.

Nonetheless, in rode John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance, the event's first corporate sponsor, with a \$10 million, 10-year contract to



replenish the event.

So, now, three marathons later, where does the money go?

According to company officials, in 1988, the money was spread among essentials (see chart).

With other miscellaneous costs, the total expenditure by Hancock is just more than \$1 million.

Is it money well spent? The mandatory answer from Hancock and race officials is (as it must be) an emphatic, "Yes, a thousand times, yes." Now they just need to find the supporting numbers.

Hancock reckons that a \$1 million or so investment gets them \$8 million in print exposure. Company communications director Jack Mahoney, calling it a "tremendous return," says the figure is reckoned thusly:

First, you take a year to collect all the press clippings, everywhere, about the marathon that mention the name John Hancock. That's about a four-foot pile. Then go through them one by one, figuring out what an ad, exactly the size of that article, would cost in the particular publication. Then add them up. Comes to precisely \$8 million—two years in a row.

And from those who are interested in hotel rooms being filled—the Greater Boston Convention and Visitors Bureau—comes that softest of all soft figures, that figure of flimsy accountancy and promotional punch: money spent in Boston on Patriot's Day weekend.

In 1985, the year so many pleaded to make the marathon a big budget event, the weekend spending figure was figured to be \$2.5 million.

For this last marathon, the bureau happily reports that people spent \$60 million in Boston on Patriot's Day weekend.

That's a 2500 percent increase!

And, somehow, with all that money being spent, numerous observers note there were still hotel rooms empty. —Raymond Krise

LOREN LATHROP AND CARLETON MENDEL WERE USING THIS RACE AS A "TUNE UP" FOR THE MARINE CORP MARATHON. (LOTS OF LUCK GUYS) WE ALL KNOW OF CARLETON'S LEGENDARY BACKGROUND, BUT LOREN HAS ONLY BEEN RUNNING FOR A YEAR!! IN FACT, HIS VERY FIRST RACE WAS THE "87" CAPE CHALLENGE. (KEEP PICKING THE EASY ONES, LOREN).



EQUIPMENT ROUND-UP

Fall is when all the shoe companies quietly introduce their new shoes for spring, and (as can be expected) there is a lot of new and exciting stuff heading our way. Even with the ever present price increases, I think that you will find the 1989 shoes to be better values than the shoes that are on the shelves now. While I can not go over everything that will be new, I will review a few companies very quickly.

Saucony has changed most of their shoes for '89. The Azura, which is selling well for a lightweight trainer, is now being offered in a new color. Building on the success of the Azura, Saucony has made a new shoe called the Arrow, which is basically a more training orientated version of the Azura. In 1989 you will find the Jazz being reborn, d/b/a the Jazz 2000 (this shoe being a cross between the old Jazz and the old Shadow, two shoes that had great popularity).

Avia is trying to make a strong push into the running field (again). They will introduce 10 all new styles (5 men, 5 women), and this new line is obviously well thought out (and they have "the right stuff" to be winners), but I wonder how many stores will carry this line . The top two models in this Avia line will have the new ARC system (a Hytrel cushioning devise inbedded in the midsole). Models that should be found in Maine are the ARC 2090 (the 2nd from the top of the line that will more or less replace the 975), the 2050 (a rugged stability shoe that replaces the 925), and the 2010 (replacing the 910). The 2010 should prove to be a great value, as it has a 2D CMEVA midsole, a Gore laceing system, a good external counter, a durable carbonized outsole, and a \$49.99 price tag (hopefully).

Asics-Tiger is offering nothing all that new, though I was excited to hear that the Epirus is reborn (in the form of the Gel Epirus). This shoe will have the same construction as the old version but with a gel pad both in the forfoot and heel.

Finally, I'll fill you in about New Balance. The 1500 is here after almost a year of pre-hype. Also new is the 595 (in both m & w models), which is basically a more stable and durable update of the old 570. Two shoes that should prove to be strong sellers for New Balance are the 676 and the 495 (both available in m & w versions). The 676 replaces the 675 (with a better midsole package), and the495 replaces the 476. New Balance has a very impressive diversity of shoes this year, with a total of 16 running shoes being offered. Every possible type of runner can be outfitted by this company, especially considering all the widths that they make and the different

shapes and styles of running shoes that they offer. The big task will be in finding the style and width that you need in Maine.

Let me wrap this up by saying the best way to by your running shoes is by shopping around. Feel free to ask questions, to try on styles that you never tried on before, to understand what types of shoes best fit your needs. It is because that consumers are so informed and knowledgable that footwear companies are putting more of a "punch" into their shoes then ever before.
