

Brookline Forward Wall Really Told Victory Tale

Eric Heitman and his backfield brigade (Joe Halligan, Dave Aronson and Kevin Fleming) were great in Brookline's 22-20 upset win

over mighty Beverly. But, if you come right down to brass tacks, it was that forward wall which deserves the lion's share of the credit in this one.

Wealthy Towner coach Eddie Schluntz is in full accord with the credit which should be heaped on his linesmen. "We figured we had to contain 'em in order to win and our boys didn't let Beverly pull off a sus-

tained drive all afternoon," he declared.

The whole right side, from center over, played the entire game. Chris Nyhan, Jim Prevorse, Frank Pons and Frank Carolan. A fifth full-timer was end Kevin McDermott who filled in for injured Don Nelson.

The others two members of the wall, Erwin Heller and Lee Davis, were on the sidelines

for a few plays each.

"This was a great effort on the part of the line, the best it's had all season," Schluntz said in praise of his boys who held Beverly to minus two yards in the first half, just 107 in the second.

The thrilling win marked Brookline's eighth without a loss, cut Beverly's skein off at 12 straight wins.

EVERETT 10; MALDEN 0: Richie Green has done a great job of taking up the slack left by Bobby Leo. In this one he scored twice, passed for one and heaved for a conversion as the Crimson Tide rolled in for its 17th without a loss.

ARLINGTON 25, BROCKTON 8: This one was cancelled last Saturday, reinstated without much notice and the Shoes now wish it had stayed off the books.

WILMINGTON 20, LYNN Field 0: The big battle among the little fellas. With Jack Bowen upping his tally to 128 points and Bob Allard passing for a pair, the Wildcats notched their 12th straight and 18th without a loss while snapping the Pioneers seven game win streak.

HUCK FINNEGAN Collegians Upset By AAU Squabble

Jim Keefe had broken the record in the New England cross country championship and, surrounded by newsmen, he said: "I want to run the collegiate mile in the Knights of Columbus meet" (Jan. 12 at the Garden.)

Dave Dunsky had won the freshman championship a half hour earlier and had said: "I hope I'm permitted to run the collegiate mile in the K. C. meet."

Larry Rawson of Boston College didn't run in the N. E. cross country championship because of an ankle injury. He was saving himself for the IC4-A's next Monday and the winter's indoor campaign. "I want to win the collegiate mile at the K. C. meet," he said.

Keefe was a disappointing eighth in that mile last winter. Dunsky was in Huntington School. Rawson (4:12.1) finished second to Yale's Bobby Mack (4:10.8) and ahead of Harvard's Mark Mullin (4:16).

He finished third to Vic Zwolak of Villanova and Jack Reilly of Georgetown in a 4:09 IC4-A indoor mile, and third again (4:07.1) to Mullin (4:06.4) and Pat Traynor of Villanova (4:06.9) in the IC4-A outdoor mile. Right now he's rated No. 1 in this area.

Keefe can come as fast as Rawson. He is the best cross country man ever seen around these parts, ahead of men like Brown's Bobby Lowe and Dartmouth's Tom Laris. He improved in the mile after his K. C. meet indoor novitiate and ran the distance in 4:12 at University of Massachusetts outdoors.

And so with these three men, plus defending champion Mack, still at Yale, Dave Farley of Brown, Ed Meehan and Ed Hamlin of Harvard, this collegiate mile could take the play away from the Open event at the same distance.

But will it? That is the question being resolved in smoke-filled rooms with the NCAA, AAU and Olympic committee all throwing punches. It all started when the NCAA accused the AAU of being moss-backed and of playing favorites in overseas appointments.

So serious has the squabble become that the fate of the indoor season is at stake. Right now Boston College is stringing along with the NCAA, which means that Rawson can be kept out of the indoor meets.

Atty. Gen. Bob Kennedy is trying to plug the hole in the dyke. Only the athletes will suffer if an armistice isn't effected.

"This collegiate stuff isn't testing enough for him." Keefe starts Saturday at Van Cortlandt Park, New York, in a small college conference meet vs. Brooklyn Poly, Adelphi, Seton Hall & Co. He will be shooting for the 25:19 mark set over the same course by McArdle in the Met. AAU meet. If he can match that, he'll be considered Olympic timber for the 10,000 meters . . . He has never been beaten in collegiate competition. He is a junior. He'll compete in the NATA meet at Omaha Nov. 24. He won it last year.

KEEFE may try the marathon but not until the 1964 Olympics are out of the way. "Johnny Kelley has told me it takes three or four years to build up to it," says the Connecticut lad. Keefe finished 17th in the Cathedral 10-mile handicap last spring. He is 21, stands 5-9 and weighs 145. He is a graduate of Derby High, Ct. Central Connecticut State was formerly known as New Britain Teachers College. It is not a member of the IC4-A.


