Collegiate Champ In Confalone Race



Something new has been added to the sixth annual "All Confalone" road race in Wakefield, which will be staged Saturday at 2 o'clock. This "something" is Vic Zwolak of Villanova, Hunter Mile winner in the BAA games last winter, IC-1-A indoor mile champion, IC-1-A cross country champion, IC-1-A outdoor three-mile champion and NCAA steeplechase champion. This is his first road racing venture in this area.

This Wakefield race, staged by the Crystal Community Club, has been changed from a ten-mile handicap (1958-59-60) to a New England 25-kilo (15 1/2 miles) championship, and the Top Ten since the change-over have been:

It is rather unusual for an intercollegiate champion to compete in a road race of 15 1/2 miles. Johnny Kelley, Alex Breckenridge, Gordon McKenzie & Co. were standout twomilers in college but delayed their marathoning efforts until they were graduated.

Zwolak, a Marine veteran, has another year to go at Villanova. Evidently he is laying the groundwork for the cross country season, at the same time pointing to the Olympic 10,000 meters.

Zwolak has such a background that he will be expected to finish 1-2 in any race he enters. He was on the U. S. team that competed at Moscow during the summer. But he'll have a hard time beating 42-year-old Fred Norris to the wire at Wakefield.

Norris started the season with a victory in the Lexington-Cambridge 10-mile with pupil Nick Cordier at his shoulder. He won the time prize at Cathedral, repeated at Salem, won the Hyde Park five-mile, the three-mile and six-mile NE championships at Hudson, later on winning distance races at East Bridgewater and Buzzards Bay. He will defend his NE cross country championship at Franklin Park next month.

Must Beat Norris

He's the fastest thing around right now, and his contest with Zwolak is an unexpected treat for the road racing fraternity.

This Wakefield race was inaugurated in 1958 in appreciation of the advertising given the town by Al Confalone.

Al was barred from the 1958 BAA marathon, along with John Lafferty and Ted Corbitt because of an alleged heart murmur. He ran any way and finished seventh. He followed this up with a bang-up second to Johnny Kelley at Yonkers, and that's when the Crystal Club decided on a 10-mile in which he could compete before the home town folk.

Al not only competed but won the race from virtual scratch. He qualified for the Pan-Am games in Chicago and finished fourth in that 1959 marathon. He was fourth in the 1960 BAA, an Olympic tryout. He was third in the 1961 Wakefield race but has done little running since. He returned to action July 4 at Needham and has come back far enough to finish in the Top Five this week.

"Fall Championship"

He'll be in fast company. In the field, in addition to Zwolak and Norris, will be Gerry Harvey, John Booras, Don Fay, Andy Ingram, Tony Sapienza, Jimmy Green, Dick Packard, Dick Weeks, George Conafrey, Paul Henden, Ralph Bushman, Ol' John Kelley and the rest of the regulars, some 70 in all.

This is a stirring tribute to Confalone. The road racing fraternity looks upon the race as his and makes sure it is an annual smasheroo. In time it will be "The fall marathon championship."

Herbert Pegs Chisox 5-2 Win Over Senators

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Pitcher Ray Herbert wrapped out a key two-run double last night and hurled the White Sox to a 5-2 victory over the Senators.

Herbert got his two-bagger in the sixth when the White Sox batted around to break a 1-1 tie with four runs. Camilo Carreon, Pete Ward, Ron Hansen and Al Weis had singled off loser Claude Osteen before Herbert climaxed the attack with his hit.

The Chicago righthander spaced out eight Washington hits in chalking up his 12th win against 10 losses.

Ward's single in the sixth tied a Chicago club record of total bases for a rookie. It gave him 278, a mark set by Zeke Bonura in 1934.

Braves Slap Move Report

MILWAUKEE (UPI)—Scoffing at rumors that the Milwaukee Braves were headed for Atlanta, San Diego, Oakland or Seattle to spend the next few seasons, chairman of the board, Bill Bartholomay Friday denied reports that his syndicate has been offered firm bids for the National League franchise.

"We are NOT moving," Bartholomay told a Milwaukee sports editor.

In a telephone interview with Oliver Kuechle (of the Milwaukee Journal) Bartholomay said the Chicago-based operation he heads "bought this club to play in Milwaukee, not in Atlanta or Seattle or San Diego or any other city."

Meanwhile, the Milwaukee association of Commerce said it was going ahead with plans to help the Braves boost their sagging attendance and a resolution was presented to the common council asking the city's economic development committee to meet with Braves management to determine what must be done to give "enthusiastic aid" to the team to end the move rumors.

HUB SWEEPERS 2 TD UNDERDOGS AT NEWARK

An injury-riddled Boston Sweepers football team was a two-touchdown underdog in its Atlantic Coast Football League game with the Southern Division leading Newark Bears Saturday night under the lights at Newark. Kickoff is 8:15.

Key injuries to Rick Sapienza and Frank Williams has made the Hub team a decided underdog. But coach Chuck Fucillo is confident his club will come up with an extra strong effort in not only trying to knock last year's champions out of the unbeaten class but breaking in to the winning column themselves for the first time this year.

"I always feel we have as much chance to win as the other team."

Fucillo will revamp his offensive lineup for the Bears, a team coached by Steve Van Buren, ex-NFL great and rated one of the top clubs in the AFL this year. Bob Fee and John (Butch) Mahoney will move into the offensive backfield along with Don Allard and Dom Gentile. Fee, moving from his offensive end position, will replace big Frank Williams at fullback. The position will not be new to the former Chelsea All-Scholastic who was Indiana U's third leading scorer in history. Don played both end and fullback at the Big 10 school. Gentile, ex-South Boston

High griddler who ran 98 yards on a kickoff last week for a touchdown against Jersey City, will shift into left halfback. And Mahoney will be the flanker back, replacing Sapienza.

Newark has beaten Springfield, Portland and Pittsburgh on successive weekends. The Sweepers tied Harrisburg, Pa. Capitals and lost to Springfield and Jersey City. The Sweepers' next home game is next Saturday night against Pittsburgh Ironmen at Everett Memorial Stadium under the lights. The club will fly out of Logan Airport Saturday on a chartered Eastern Constellation flight and return right after the game. A party of 90 will make the trip.

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
