Brown's Harriers Crave IC4-A Title

Brown University's cross country team, coached by Ivan Fuqua, finished one point behind Cornell in the Heptagonal championships, and that so irritated athletes and coach that nothing less than victory in Monday's IC4-A race at Van Cortland Park, New York, will satisfy them.

Fuqua has the horses, and the big one is Dave Farley, who finished sixth last year and fourth in this year's Heps.

"Farley's been an excellent captain," said Fuqua. "Oftentimes he's sacrificed himself to pull another runner along, but this IC4-A race is a fight for survival, and everybody will be going all out."

This is the East's top collegiste prize; and Farley will have to run the race of his life to catch defending champion Vic Zwolak of Villanova, who also holds the indoor IC4-A mile title. Zwolak is a veteran with eyes on the Olympic 10,000 meter competition.

Fighting for places in the Top Ten with Zwolak and Farley will be Warren Vander Veer of Rutgers, Edoardo Duchini of Georgetown, Ed Bowes of Manhattan, Hep champion Bill Straub of Army, Bill Clark and Frank Carver of Notre Dame, Met intercollegiate champion John Loeschorn, Steve Machooka and Bill Byard of Cornell, Bob Brouillet of Massachusetts and Walt Hewlett of Harvard.

Chances of the team title for Brown are rosier than that of an individual title, because behind Farley are old reliables Bob Rothenberg, 1961 New England freshman champion Vic Boog, Pat O'Donnell of Scituate, Bill Kinsella and Bob Wooley. The won the New Englands hands down and defeated Cornell and Harvard in their tri meet in October.

Brown was sixth in the IC4-A team standings a year ago with champion Villanova, Michigan State, Notre Dame, Seton Hall and Georgetown ahead of them in that order.

He started the long campaign with victory in the Lexington-Cambridge 10-mile, then copped the time prize in Cathedral. He broke down in the long one, the BAA marathon, finishing 18th, and that disturbed him greatly because he finished third in his only other try. He's determined to square accounts in '64. That race holds the key to his future.
