MYSTERY AND DEATH. Sag Harbor Bank Cashier Commits Suicide.

No Explanation Given of Edgar C. Wade's Act.

Money Accounts and Deposits All Found Correct.

Edgar C. Wade, aged 56, treasurer and cashier of the Sag Harbor Savings Bank, shot and instantly killed himself at 9 o'clock this morning.

Wade was in the town for Ogden on an early train, and soon afterward a servant heard a shot in the rooming house.

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DAYS AT HARVARD.

Prof. W. W. Goodwin Bade Farewell to Friends.

The Noted Greek Scholar Guest at a Banquet.

Presented with Magnificent Silver Loving Bowl.

William W. Goodwin, professor of Greek in Harvard College, after a career extending over half a century, which has placed him at the head among Greek scholars of his country, bade farewell to his colleagues and friends at a banquet given on the front porch of the graduates of Harvard College in the magnificent ballroom of the Hotel Somerset, this city, last night.

The main table was profusely decorated with flowers, and the crimson decorations of the ballroom, mingled with the white and gold, were particularly appropriate to the occasion.

It was nearly 9:30 o'clock when Bishop Lawrence called the company to order, and the Rev. George W. Adams, president of the board of trustees, presented Prof. Goodwin with a magnificent chased silver bowl, bearing the following inscription:

TO WILLIAM WATSON GOODWIN. With the Love of His Colleagues and Loyal Friends.

Bishop Lawrence, in presenting the bowl spoke of the work which Prof. Goodwin had done for the college and the world.

He was, said the bishop, "not only an original but an interpreter of the work of the great men of his time, and what nobler work can man do than to interpret the work of the great men of his time?"

Prof. Goodwin was greeted by a loud cheer and a prolonged outburst of applause when he rose to reply.
