

County tracksters score well in relays

MILLINOCKET — Piscataquis County was well represented last Saturday at the all-weather track meet in Millinocket. Spearheaded by the triple gold performance of senior star Linda Hovencamp the Foxcroft Academy girls brought home the highest amount of ribbons along with a Penquis league runner-up final standing.

Hovencamp, who dominated the meet with wins in the javelin, 1600 meter, and 3200 meter, led her maroon and white contingent to the highest placing in over five years as they nudged Mt View 88.5 to 88 points to go in second behind the winner, Mattanacook of Lincoln, who notched 112.

Mt View could very well have been the best girls team there, even with the graduation loss of Beth Haslam. However, a cruel twist of fate befell the ladies from Thorndike when their three event state finalist of last year, Heidi Irving, came down with a severe case of mononucleosis.

Foxcroft did come away with some brilliant individual showing besides Hovencamp with senior high jump school record holder Tracey Merrill winning her specialty with a leap of 4ft 8ins and junior Tammi Wakeland finishing a strong second in the 3200. Other ribbons included Holly Smith's second in the high jump, Laura Taylor's third in the 1600 and 800, and Kelly Hurd's fourth in the 300 hurdles.

Coach Gene Philpot was full of praise for her girls and is predicting they will make the regional in two weeks at the new facility at Orono High School.

Piscataquis Community High School (PCHS) pilot John Connor had plenty to crow about as well with Eva Pullyard taking a third in the 200 and sixth in the 400 Callie Ross shaking off her two week il-

ness made the trip to Stearns and notched a fourth in the discus and fifth in the shot put to at least get her into the regionals and hopefully back into the swing of things. The 4x100 relay squad of Pullyard, Julie French, Kim Kristoff, and Carla Bridges had a respectable fifth.

Ron Pelletier, the mentor of the Laker girls, although bothered by illness to a pair of regular point producers in Mary Goulet and Chris Loris, still managed a 26 total, up two points from last year. "Dawna Davis is a clutch performer as witnessed by her best jumps always coming in the finals," said Pelletier. "She will be in the regionals and should be even better. She had a second in the triple at 35 ft 5.5 ins and a third in the long jump."

Also her sophomore partner on the E M Class D hoop champions Lisa Harris had a third in the shot while newcomer Paula Lessard the ski champion placed third in the javelin.

For the boys of the county, Laker Artie O'Connor was by far the best of the lot with a phenomenal leap of 44 ft and 5ins in the triple which broke his old school mark by two feet. Last year he set the mark at 38 feet and have moved up steadily ever since he also had a school record in the long jump of 20ft 3ins good enough for first while also getting digits in the 440 (second) and 220 (fourth).

Todd Lessard was second in the javelin and sixth in the discus while Dirk Salsbury was second in the pole vault and third in the high jump. Senior George Belmont had a fifth in the 40 but Mike Othouse missed his chance for a ribbon with a pulled hamstring in the semi-finals.

One disappointment to new rookie coach Gene

Murray was the absence of Jeff Bell and John Hawkins, who had figured into the overall scheme of things for the Lakers.

Pirate coach Connor, for the first time in years, will have boys in the regionals as Paul Cloutier raced to a second in the 300 hurdles and Tim Noll was brilliant in placing third in a class 3200 meter field that saw him give up second in the last 100 yards of the race. Dom Riitano also had a fifth in the javelin for 16 points after being shutout last year.

Pony boys pilot George Rolleston also got buried by Mattanacook, which got a record 201 points for an average of 11 points per event. Mike Lyford had 8.5 for FA with a third in the javelin and a fifth in the shot while helping the 400 relay to a fifth place.

Donnie Dean broke an 18 year old record in the 800 meter set by the great Bobby Annis in 1966 with a time of 2.11.8. He also took the 1600 meter relay team to a third place showing. Dean's clocking in the 800 however was not even in the top three to show the classiness of the field. Al Surrutte had a fifth in the 3200 as did Shawn Weymouth in the pole vault. Others notching sixth places were Kevin

MacGlaulin in the javelin and relay, Don Clark in the pole vault and 300 hurdles, and A.J. McVetty, Paul Flanders, and Scott Cleaves in various relays.

The regular season continues with meets at Greenville and Foxcroft in preparation for the regionals in two weeks.
