County stars shine in Penquis relays

MILLINOCKET — Although the Mattanacook Academy track team took both boys' and girls' team laurels at last Saturday's Penquis Relays held at Stearns High School, the three Piscataquis County schools represented had several exceptional performances. Foxcroft Academy (FA) led the way with a second place for the boys and a third for the girls. Piscataquis Community High (PCHS) was next, with a close fourth place for the girls, while the lads were next to last. Greenville, having an uncharacteristically lean year, placed just ahead of the Pirates in the boys' division, while the girls' team brought up the rear.

Individual county winners were Bonnie Smith for FA in the high jump, Tami Wakeland for FA in the 3200 meter run, and Dawna Davis for Greenville in the triple jump. Really coming to the front were double winners Laura Taylor for the Ponies in the 1600 and 800, and Pirate Vickie Higgins, who took top honors in the shot put and javelin.

Wakeland came in first in the 1600, but was disqualified on a judges' dispute over a lane violation. The win was instead given to Wakeland's teammate Taylor, with PCHS freshman Carla Lemieux second. The young Pirate also had a second in the 3200 behind Wakeland. Winning time was 12:36.7.

Higgins, the prize Pirate field event specialist, threw the javelin 100 feet; some eight feet farther than her previous best. Her shot put throw of 36 feet and three-quarters was also a personal best. She also had a second in the discus, as did Laker David in the long jump, to go with her winning triple hop-skip-jump effort of 33.94. Paula Lessard, the steady Laker javelin thrower, had a second.

Third place county finishers for the girls were Trisha Vainio of PCHS in the 100 hurdles, FA's Lisa Hewett in the javelin, and the 400 relay of PCHS made up of Eva Pullyard, Bridie Bridges, Trisha Vainio, and Amanda Worden.

For the boys, after the Lynx took 15 of the 17 firsts, they had amassed a total of 244.5 points to FA's runner-up total of 93. Pony Mike Lyford did place first in the javelin with a toss of 170-2.

Second place ribbons went to Don Clark of FA in the long jump, Derrick Lane in the pole vault for Greenville, with Clark third. Laker Tom Othouse was second in the 100, as was Pirate Paul Cloutier in the 300 hurdles with a fast time of 43.3; his best ever. Lyford put a second in the triple alongside his first in the javelin and third in the discus. Pony Tony Redmond had a third in the 400. The PCHS relay team in the 4 by 100 took second with Rick Thomas, Rick Armstrong, John Connor, and Paul Cloutier.

County athletes now await the regionals on June 1 at Orono High School, with the top six in each event going to the state Class C competition June 8.
